## GIHS Student is National Merit Scholarship Semifinalist

Congratulations goes out to Grand Island High School senior Kevin Rogoza, who was selected as a semifinalist for the National Merit Scholarship Program!

Kevin joins approximately 16,000 semifinalists across the nation for the 66th annual scholarship program, which honors individual students who show exceptional academic ability and potential for success in rigorous college studies. The semifinalists will

continue in the competition for thousands of scholarships worth more than \$30 million, which will be awarded in the spring.

According to the National Merit Scholarship Corp., over 1.5 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools entered the 2021 competition by taking the 2019 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of semifinalists represents less than 1% of U.S. high school seniors.

Two additional Grand Island students – Eleah Leng and Vincent Ricotta – were also commended as part of the competition. Commended students placed among the top 50,000 scorers for the PSAT/NMSQT.

# **New Sidway Playground Gets Community Touch**

After three years of fundraisers, extensive planning, meetings and moving major mountains of engineered wood fiber chips, Charlotte Sidway Elementary School's new playground is complete!

The Sidway playground was beginning to show its age after 26 years of providing fun and physical exercise for students and families across Grand Island. In the fall of 2017, Principal Denise Dunbar brought a committee of dedicated and enthusiastic teachers and

parents together to begin planning for a new playground. The committee, under the direction of chairperson and teaching assistant Linda Samland, got right to work looking at multiple sources for design, enlisting presentations from a variety of companies, researching appropriate and safe equipment and planning fundraising opportunities.



The first fundraiser

was the Monster Mash! Although the committee was not sure how a Halloween dance for Kindergarten and first-grade students would go, it was nothing short of a huge success, raising over \$2,000! Many faculty and staff volunteered their time, dressed in costume and provided safe and fun activities for the students to celebrate Halloween 2017.

Additional fundraising events included a coffee sale, a Holiday walk, a pizza night, a basket raffle, furniture hand painted by the teachers, Bills tickets, and even a jet ski was raffled off at the Kick Off to Summer event! All of these events, coupled with a generous grant from then-Sen. Chris Jacobs, a matching grant from GameTime (the manufacturing company) and many donations from the community, enough money was raised and a community build date was set.

The final event took place on Oct. 24, 2020, when many faculty and staff members and parents came together to move three gigantic mountains of engineered wood fiber for the surface. Members of the Buildings and Grounds Department volunteered their time and resources to mix concrete and set benches and signs prior to the other volunteers coming out on a cold October Saturday to move and rake the wood chips.

Despite the arrival of COVID just as a community build was being organized, the District worked with the committee to see that the playground became a reality, and it is now complete! Very thorough inspections have been conducted, and the final steps involve receiving documentation and approval to open it to play!

On March 15, 2020, school districts in Erie County closed due to 3 cases of COVID-19 being identified in the region. ## **Message From Your BOE President**

Happy 2021, fellow islanders! Thank you for reading the winter edition of The Bridge. This is proving to be a school year full of adaptations as we began implementing a hybrid instructional mode and were required to pivot quickly to our remote learning plan. I know the 100% virtual learning environment creates significant challenges for our families and students alike. As a public school district, we must comply with the Micro Cluster Action Initiative while continuing to advocate for necessary adjustments to state mandates.

During a Red/Orange Zone designation under the initiative from Gov. Andrew Cuomo, it was impossible for the Grand Island CSD to test 100% of our school population upon reopening under the original requirements. First, the District would not obtain 100% parental permission to perform such testing, and we are not a public entity with the infrastructure to support such a burdensome, unfunded state mandate. There has been and continues to be vigorous advocacy on numerous fronts for school districts to act as partners with our state and local public health organizations for COVID-19 monitoring efforts. At the virtual legislative breakfast hosted by Erie County Association of School Boards on Nov. 14, I advocated for targeted monitoring that requires smaller percentages of students tested given the less than 1% infection rates we have seen in schools across Western New York. This would be doable for most school districts throughout Erie County. Since then, testing requirements have changed to 20% and 30% in a month for orange and red zones, respectively. We are thankful the state has changed these rules, allowing us to return to our hybrid model of learning.

The board has received questions and emails from parents regarding the full reopening of schools, and many community members have attended our meetings. Several parents have asked why Chromebooks were not in, and one parent started a funding page. Please know the inability to obtain Chromebooks is not a funding issue. We do have a technology grant to purchase personal devices for students, however with every school district in the country ordering the devices this past spring and summer, these electronics were on backorder for several months now. Thankfully, they are finally starting to come in and our Technology Department has been working as quickly as possible to get these devices in the hands of students.

Another statement I have heard at our meetings is to think creatively, and lead, by renting spaces across the island so all students can attend school every day while maintaining 6 feet of social distance. In addition to needing more nurses, administrators, special area teachers and many other staff members for each space, the approval process required by the New York State Education Department (NYSED) is extensive and very costly. For example,

the Commissioner must approve each leased space, and certification by a licensed architect and engineer must be sought to determine that the whole building is – in addition to the space being rented – in compliance with NYSED's Uniform Fire and Prevention Code. There must be a site plan, floor plan, certificate of occupancy, and many other documents prepared for each rented space. In summary, it is not as simple as paying for a leased space somewhere on the island and bussing our children there the following week.

A seemingly easy task like erecting a tent outside also has training procedures, approvals, and paperwork that must be completed to remain in compliance with legal requirements and mandates in place to keep children safe.

I can say with confidence that Dr. Graham, his administrative team, teacher and SRP leaders, and the school board have worked diligently to put measures in place to ensure everyone's safety. Since last spring, all parties have planned carefully alongside other community committee members for hybrid, remote, and full inperson learning. Please know that our board continues to focus on reopening efforts as well as reviewing our hybrid and virtual models intently at our meetings and at additional committee level meetings. More than 12 in-person or virtual workshops have been presented to our school and community by Dr. Graham individually or with the board. During these events, documents reviewed can be accessed on the Reopening tab of the District website or by visiting www.grandislandschools.org/reopening.

In closing, I look forward to continued feedback as we navigate through these challenging times together. Please understand that we all want the same thing; we want our schools opened Monday through Friday, to see athletes continue to play sports and to watch performances of our talented musicians again. The health and safety of each and every student, teacher, and staff member is at the forefront of decision-making, and the District has been working diligently to prepare to meet state-mandated Micro Cluster Action Initiatives in order to return to and/or continue with in-person instruction. Thank you again for your cooperation and understanding and for sending your children to the Grand Island School District. I hope that you and your family have a safe and blessed new year.

## STEM Meets ELA Class in Sixth Grade

Students in Mary Howard's sixth-grade ELA class at Veronica E. Connor Middle School used a Makey Makey device to control virtual worlds that they designed on CoSpacesEDU.

Their virtual worlds showed the settings of the novels that they had recently finished and included animated items and characters. They then coded their scenes to display the plot structure of their stories. This code "talked" to the Makey Makey device so that they had essentially created a control panel for their computer, allowing a user to touch a button to reveal the exposition, rising action, climax and resolution to their novels.



Students completed the project and then shared their work with one another through a gallery walk experience.



## UPK Registration Begins March 1

As we move into spring, please note the Grand Island Central School District will begin accepting Universal Pre-Kindergarten 2021-22 registrations for the annual UPK Lottery on March 1, 2021. To be eligible for the UPK program, children must be 4 years old on or before Dec. 1, 2021.

UPK is a grant-funded program which is dependent upon state aid. The amount of aid extended to our district will be the determining factor on the number of students served.

The UPK program within the Grand Island Central School District is on track for another successful year. Each year, the District runs two UPK sites. In addition to our Charlotte Sidway Elementary School location, which runs a morning and afternoon session, we will be working with Kiddo's Korner Preschool for the 2021-22 academic school year. Kiddo's Korner Preschool will be providing an afternoon session as our community-based provider and is located at 2728 Stony Point Rd.

Our education centers provide an excellent program for 4-year-old preschool children within our community. Currently, as a group, they are servicing 43 children adhering to a New York State Education Department-approved pre-K curriculum. The program requires attendance five days per week, 2.5 hours per day and follows the District's academic calendar. Transportation is NOT provided by the District.

The 2021-22 UPK lottery draw is tentatively scheduled for May 19, 2021. The registration deadline for the lottery will be Friday, May 14, 2021 at 2 p.m.

## Kindergarten Registration Begins Mid-February

To effectively plan for the 2021-22 school year, the Grand Island Central School District would like to know how many children reside on Grand Island who are eligible for kindergarten in September 2021.

Kindergarten registration for the 2021-22 school year will begin mid-February. If you have a child turning 5 years of age on or before Dec. 1, 2021, please call the Grand Island Central School District Office at 773-8800 x0. Student registrations are done by appointment ONLY.

2021-2022 GICSD enrollment packets will be available on our website, www.grandislandschools.org, as well as at our District Office, located at 1100 Ransom Rd. Registration packets will be available for pickup daily between the hours of 8 a.m. and 3 p.m.



This information will assist our transportation department as well as state and federal funding.

# Fund Helps Libraries Purchase SocialEmotional Learning Books

Each year, one of the school libraries in the Grand Island Central School District receives a donation of \$500 from the Leslie R. Morris Memorial Philanthropic Fund. The fund was established by Dr. Sharon Cramer in 2010 to honor the memory of her late husband. Mr. Morris was a long-time Grand Island resident who was a voracious reader, librarian and book lover. Over the last decade, the funds have been used to purchase books about several topics like history, geography, animals, sports and biographies. The libraries are thankful to be the recipients of this generous donation.

Given the unusual nature of this school year, the annual donation is being shared between all five libraries. Each school library received \$100 to add materials that support social-emotional learning for students, faculty, and families. At the secondary level, books that were purchased include topics that address developing coping skills and resilience in challenging times. Other materials include books that illuminate societal tensions. At the elementary level, books that were purchased include picture books that promote empathy, compassion and kindness. Teachers will use these materials to connect with students and help them to share their feelings and emotions.

Stories are a powerful way to connect students to their feelings while encouraging them to discover the power within themselves. These resources purchased through the Leslie Morris Book Project will provide an opportunity for teachers to foster positive learning environments and respond to students' concerns during these challenging times.


