Officials Cut Ribbon on **Multi-Sports Complex**

Crews have been wrapping up sitework on a new, state-of-the-art multi-sports complex behind Grand Island High School.

District officials cut the ribbon on the complex recently, celebrating the opening of the facility to student sports programs. The new additions include a synthetic turf field for baseball, softball, lacrosse, soccer and football, as well as a concession building and new lighting. The tennis courts adjacent to the high school were also replaced.

"Our students as well as our community youth sports programs will have the best facilities to utilize for many years to come," Superintendent Dr. Brian Graham stated.

The multi-sports complex was built as part of a \$24 million capital improvement project approved by voters in 2019. The project was designed to address District needs in

the areas of building repairs, heating, instruction and safety.

With synthetic turf, drainage is improved so home games are not canceled due to poor weather. Officials hope this will result in less frequent canceled home games for baseball and softball.

Work for the capital project also included visible interior renovations to both Veronica E. Connor

We were thrilled to be able to bring students back for full-time instruction in recent weeks. 




Sidway Student Plays Violin for Class

Register Your Child for Kindergarten Today!

Spring is here and that means if you have a child turning 5 on or before Dec. 1, 2021, it is time to start thinking about kindergarten! Here are a few important steps for you to be taking now!

Registration

Registration is open at the District Office. Please call 773-8800 for an appointment to register. It is easy to access all the necessary paperwork online and fill it out prior to your appointment. You must be registered to begin receiving important information about kindergarten. You must register even if your child was in UPK and/or if your child received special education services as a preschooler. It is very important to register, and you can do that now!

Screening

When you register, you will be given an appointment for kindergarten screening. We hope to conduct screenings in person this summer. It will take place Aug. 17, 18, 19, 20 and 23. Screening takes about an hour, it takes place at Sidway Elementary and you are expected to stay with your child. You will have an opportunity to meet some teachers, our school nurse and some members of the PTA.

Orientation

Orientation typically takes place in early June. You would typically attend Sidway on an afternoon with your child. Both of you would have an opportunity to meet several faculty and staff, experience part of a typical day and even have a bus ride.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, we cannot do those things this year. We will post an orientation video this school year, as we did last year.


